47th CLERMONT-FERRAND INTERNATIONAL SHORT FILM FESTIVAL

The Clermont-Ferrand International Short Film Festival is the world's leading event dedicated to short films. Documentaries, animated features, comedies, today's realities, genre films, graduation works from the world's best schools: the Clermont-Ferrand festival's extensive programme brings together and confronts the worlds of filmmakers from all horizons and all continents. Any film under sixty minutes is eligible for selection in the national competition, and under forty minutes for the other competitions.

Between competitions and retrospectives, hundreds of films from all over the world offer audiences a refreshing dive into the world of young filmmakers.

Founded in 1979 as part of a student film club, the event quickly took off. Today, it is the biggest film event in the Auvergne Rhône-Alpes region, and exists as such thanks to an ever-growing regional, national and international audience.

Supported by teams committed to promoting access to culture for all, the members of the collective are constantly evolving, while retaining a lively, independent spirit. Dozens of members of the association and employees of Sauve qui peut le court-métrage work collaboratively to produce a programme of short films every year.

In 2025, the festival hopes to welcome, as it does every year, almost 4,000 professionals from all five continents, and beat its record of 170,000 admissions. It will be the 47th national competition, the 37th international competition, the 24th labo competition, devoted to innovative and experimental forms, and the 40th Marché du Film Court

In keeping with its humanist spirit, the festival is certified as an eco-committed event, and has adopted a charter of good conduct to combat sexist and sexual violence.

In 2025, the festival adopted a new visual identity. The new graphic charter was designed by Laure Fournier.

Organized by the Sauve qui peut le court métrage association, the 47th festival (and its Marché du Film Court) will take place from 31st January to 8th February 2025.

In addition to the festival, the association works throughout the year to disseminate short films throughout the region, and supports young filmmakers through various training courses and residencies.

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2025 POSTER

Each year, the festival poster features the work of an artist. The artist is invited to take part in the international jury the previous year, to immerse himself or herself in the festival and the region, and to sign the poster for the next edition.

The poster for this 47th edition, signed by French illustrator **Marie Larrivé**, is a ticket to a universe where the boundaries between reality and imagination become blurred, and the slopes of the Michelin Cataroux site stand out against a backdrop of psychedelic aurora borealis.

Throughout the program, nods to last year's award-winning films are abundant, while paying homage to the Lebanese focus and the thematic retrospective devoted to sound that will make up the Panorama section of the 2025 festival.

A painter and video artist, Marie Larrivé developed her practice of still and moving images during her studies at ENSAD Paris. Trained in model-making, traditional cartooning and painting techniques, she explores different types of narrative. Questions of movement and fiction are at the heart of her practice. Her short film *Noir-Soleil* was awarded the SACD prize for best French-language animated film in Clermont-Ferrand in 2022, and in 2024 her work was featured in Lucas Malbrun's *Margarethe 89* (script and sets), presented in national competition.







2026 Poster

To prepare the poster for the 2026 edition, Lithuanian illustrator Karolis Strautniekas will be invited to discover the festival for the first time as a spectator for five days, and will draw inspiration from his discoveries to propose a visual that will adorn the 48th edition. After studying at the Vilnius Academy of Fine Arts, he has been working as a freelance artist for over 10 years, in fields ranging from advertising and publishing to animation. AWARDS AND CLOSING CEREMONIES

Two award ceremonies will take place during the short film festival.

The first one, the **PARTNER AWARDS CEREMONY**, will take place on Thursday 6th February at 4pm in the Salle Boris Vian at the Maison de la Culture. Hosted by Pierre Zéni, the winners will receive their prizes directly from the hands of the festival's partners.

CLOSING CEREMONY, will be held in the Salle Jean Cocteau at the Maison de la Culture on Saturday February 8th at 6pm, presented by Patrick Fabre Cat - in the presence of the juries.

The second and final event, the PUBLIC

Depending on the competition (international, national, lab or XR) or programme (Prix POP-UP or CANAL+ KIDS) in which the films are entered, they may win a Vercingétorix.

GEOGRAPHIC FOCUS: LEBANON

MAABAR

A journey across new Lebanese cinema

Shaken by tragic events, it is difficult to sum up the current situation in Lebanon. Despite all these obstacles, the Lebanese seventh art has taken on an astonishing breadth and scope in recent years. The result is a blend of genres and styles from a cosmopolitan country where cultures and ideas mingle.

Three programmes will focus on films produced over the last twenty years, and one will be entirely devoted to the work of **Wissam Charaf**, a filmmaker who has been selected and awarded several prizes at the festival. He will be talking to festival audiences at a Masterclass on Tuesday 4th February.

Nadia Daou, a musical artist known as Nâr, will be on the jury Lab, giving a film in concert at Dark Lab on Wednesday 5th February.

Photographer Lara Tabet, who trained as a doctor-biologist and is now an artist-researcher, will be exhibiting at the Hôtel Fontfreyde, Centre Photographique de Clermont-Ferrand. Opening 6th February at 6.30 pm.

Also at the Hôtel Fontfreyde, an installation will present a series of podcasts entitled Maabar, retracing the history of the Lebanese war (1975-1990) through the accounts of those who lived through it.

A **Décibels!** programme will be devoted entirely to Lebanon.


The **Short Film Market** will host a large Lebanese delegation, under the leadership of the Beirut Film Society, the Beirut Festival and the Batroun Festival.

The poster for the Lebanese focus (opposite) is by Lebanese artist Brahim Samaha, a painter and engraver. He is also the founder of the <u>Cabriolet Film Festival</u>, which has been held in Beirut for the past fifteen years. He will be attending the festival and taking part in the exhibition Anatomie du labo, to be held at Le Lieu-Dit.

+ Two programmes Collections

Like the programme devoted to Wissam Charaf, a selection will be devoted to the filmmaker and reporter <u>Jocelyne Saab</u>, a pioneer of new Lebanese cinema, who has left behind an immense and powerful body of work, including the so-called Beirut trilogy, which recounts 'her' war in heart-rending documentaries.

Also presented in the Collection: the *Letters* series. At the end of 2023, faced with the violence in Gaza, 18 Lebanese filmmakers got together to share their dismay. They randomly exchanged letters. The short films in this programme are taken directly from the letters received by each of them.



THEMATIC RETROSPECTIVE: LE BRUIT QUI COURT

Le bruit court in Clermont: in 2025, cinema is about to make itself heard. This retrospective will invite audiences to rediscover cinema through the prism of sound, a universe where every rustle becomes a key player in the story. Through four programmes, spectators will be offered a cinema where every sound tells a story, where every vibration amplifies an emotion. Loudspeakers, boom operators, sound engineers and field recordists will create atmospheres that envelop the image, transforming sound into genuine narrative material. The aim is to take a behind-the-scenes look at sound effects and question our perception of images through their sonic counterparts. These often invisible creators transform every rustle and rustle of everyday life into aural works of art, offering an experience where sound is the invisible hero, and your ears become the guides to an unprecedented cinematic journey.

Her exceptional career has been crowned with numerous awards, including, in April 2021, the Oscar for Best Sound for her work on Darius Marder's Sound of Metal

Sound films

The festival transforms La Comédie's rehearsal studio into a space for immersive listening: a total immersion with Radio France and France Culture's flagship creations. Thanks to 360° broadcasting, the world of sound takes on a new dimension: dialogues, atmospheres and 3D sounds redefine the art of storytelling. Monday February 3 to Thursday February 6.

The Original Soundtrack Challenge

The International Competition of Composition for Image is part of the festival's official programme every two years, this competition will delight festival-goers in 2025, and is open to composers of all ages and nationalities.

The works of the finalists will be performed by the Orchestre National d'Auvergne at the public final at the Opéra de Clermont-Ferrand on Thursday 6th February.

+ Bloody Night

Designed specifically in the spirit of the thematic retrospective, this BLOOD-stamped programme aims to thrill you with the sound of 8 films: eerie music, creepy ASMR, fatal compositions, gnashing of teeth or shrill screams, get ready to take a sound bath!



INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION

The International Competition is a meeting place for the different horizons that make up the richness of the world's short film industry. Animation masterpieces, documentaries, comedies, contemporary realities, genre films, graduation works from the world's best schools - this year there are 64 films, divided into 12 programmes , which witness, question and invite us to take a fresh look at a reality where the everyday rubs shoulders with the extraordinary.

This year, humour becomes a gentle but incisive weapon in the international selection. Humour that evokes Brexit through the daily lives of rhubarb farm owners, follows Norwegian tourists traveling to Greece in search of pirate adventures that go awry, or tries to laugh off the climate crisis by starting a frantic countdown to the end of the world.

The selection also features portraits of struggle and resilience: in Iran with women who rebel, in Ukraine when a woman decides to carry on living in the midst of chaos, or in Palestine with a couple trying to escape their past.

In the face of sometimes unbearable daily life, imagination becomes a lifeline, and hope is reinvented through dreams or mysticism. We can then choose to recount a fantasized life to leave harsh reality behind, or to soothe anxieties by turning to spirituality.

These short films, whether they make us laugh, struggle or dream, resonate with our lives, here and elsewhere. They remind us that art is as much a mirror as an escape route. This programme is an invitation to look at the world differently, through the eyes of those who tell it best.

NATIONAL COMPETITION

The national competition showcases the best of French production over the past year, with 11 programmes of short films from all genres and backgrounds. Two French films are also entered in the international competition.

This national selection spares nothing and no-one. With a harshness tinged with poetry, it alternates between the brutality of a crude social reality and the freedom offered by stories where the boundaries between the tangible and the imaginary are blurred. Some films push the boundaries of the absurd to the extreme, while others let the fantastic intrude into stories that are deeply rooted in our times.

For many years now, French cinema as a whole has been attempting to produce a social critique, tackling contemporary issues: the world of work is becoming a closed-door setting where invisible but universal tensions are played out. Work as a motif will therefore be at the heart of a number of entries, from shepherds and chambermaids (in animation or continuous shooting) a border guard on the Andalusian coast or a security guard at Hellfest.


The harshness of reality bursts out in stories of struggle and injustice, exposing systemic violence, and these stories are embodied in fighting characters: this is no longer the time for simple, cold facts, and some short films try to get to the root of these scourges, and put us in the shoes of the executioners or the victims. In Genealogy of Violence (Genealogie de la violence), director and visual artist Mohamed Bourouissa slows down time to make us endure the heaviness and injustice of an arbitrary police check.

Finally, and because we need it, the Ubuesque humour that fits so well with the short format will be on show, with, among others, Philippe Rebbot in top form, in his own role in *Mort d'un acteur*. Sensitivity, at the heart of each work, is a common thread that illuminates the darkness of the world and sometimes offers a glimmer of hope.

LAB COMPETITION

Originally devoted to existing films on non-silver supports, the Labo, acknowledging that the most interesting works were those on the fringes, has freed itself from the barriers of narrative and mixed genres in order to offer a place to creators with no particular training in cinema: graphic designers, architects, choreographers and even musicians are taking over the moving image to works offer daring that emphasise experimentation. People flock here to discover works that are out of this world, literally out of this world. The Clermont-Ferrand lab opens its doors to the most curious, with unexpected intersections, original perspectives consummate art of risk-taking.

For several years now, documentaries have had a prominent place in the Labo competition, with many films winning awards and selections after their run in Clermont-Ferrand, including Maalbeek (Special Effects Award and Audience Award in 2021) and La Mécanique des fluides by Gala Hernández López (selected in 2023),

which won the César for Best Documentary Short in 2022 and 2024 respectively; or the films by Pang Chuan Huang (twice winner of the Grand Prize in the Labo competition), which are regularly selected at the IDFA (International Documentary Festival Amsterdam).

But the lab is also about animation, which is making an impressive comeback in the selection: this technique is present in no fewer than 11 films, and if, like Emil Ferris, you love monsters, you're in for a treat. Ultra-sexed Looney Tunes explore the origins of a trauma, a tribute to Miyazaki can be discovered in the midst of a turbulent, hyper-connected fantasy bestiary, and AI monsters are also on the loose in *The Eggregores' Theory*.

Dystopian, connected, furious and curious, welcome to Lab 2.

The Atelier is a temporary film school open to the public for five days during the festival. A truly collaborative space, it's an opportunity for future cinema and audiovisual professionals to delve into the secret of film-making. It's a chance to explore new practices, to meet new people and to inspire new ideas.

The Atelier is a production by the ENS d'Architecture de Clermont-Ferrand, the Centre Camille-Claudel, the Conservatoire Emmanuel-Chabrier de Clermont-Ferrand and Sauve qui peut le court métrage.

Admission to the Atelier is free, Monday 3 to Friday 7th February 10am to 12pm and 2pm to 5pm Marquee reception, courtyard of the Centre Blaise-Pascal, Rue Neuve des Carmes, 63000 Clermont-Ferrand To achieve this, the programme offers a wide range of workshops highlighting the different film professions: directing, photography, electro, machino, acting, set design, modelling, matte painting, animation, special effects direction, concept art, musical composition, dressing, make-up and costumes.



Guest School

In 2025, **HEAD**, the Geneva School of Art and Design, will be in the spotlight.

Created in 2006 through the merger of schools with over two centuries of history each, the École supérieure des Beaux-Arts and the Haute école d'Arts appliqués, HEAD - Genève draws on a rich cultural and artistic tradition to promote young creative talent at national and international level. In 2025, as it celebrates 50 years of teaching cinema in Geneva, the school will be presenting 2 programmes of short films featuring past and present students.

They will also be present at the Atelier, where **Bachelor students and sound specialists from HEAD** Cinéma will be working on sound effects for several films shot with the legendary Bolex camera during a workshop with director **Marie Losier**.

ALSO DURING THE FESTIVAL

Young audience

It is a chance for youngsters to sharpen their eyes and their critical faculties and become the festivalgoers of tomorrow, through a real school for budding film buffs.

The KIDS programme will be a special time for families, always free on presentation of a special ticket.

The festival's Young Audiences screenings will also be presented to schools, with a dedicated week from 27th to 31st January.

The Feature Film Session

The director and actor Lawrence Valin will be premiering his first feature film *Little Jaffna*. He has made several high-profile appearances at Clermont-Ferrand: his short film -also called *Little Jaffna*- won the Prix Canal + in 2018, and in 2020 he left the festival with the Best Actor award for his role in *The Loyal Man*.

Masterclasses

Two Masterclasses will punctuate the 2025 program. The first will be with **Wissam Charaf**, who will explain his commitment and creative process. (see page 5) and the other 'Sound in cinema, the art of storytelling' with sound engineer **Michelle Couttolenc** (see page 6).

The Dark Lab

Dark Lab #3 is coming. The Dark Lab Microbrasserie brewery and Biscuit Production are teaming up once again for the Off du Court from 31 January to 8 February 2025 at Le Lieu Dit with the Clermont-Ferrand short film festival. Live music, DJ sets, cineconcerts, craft beer from 8pm to 4am (depending on the day).

Micro sessions

With a view to bring the films and the audience closer together, filmmakers in the three competitions will be invited to discuss their films with the audience in the cinema directly after their screening. The Micro screenings will take place from Sunday to Saturday, in room 4 of Ciné Jaude, for each of the national, international and lab screenings.



The exhibitions

- The exhibition at the Hôtel Fontfreyde, Centre Photographique de Clermont-Ferrand will be an opportunity to discover the work of Lebanese artist Lara Tabet (see page 5). From 3rd February to 29th March.
- **Silence(s) exhibition**: the traditional thematic exhibition by Clermont-Ferrand artists at the Chapelle des Cordeliers, from 27th January to 15th January.
- Exhibition KIBLIND PRESENTS an exhibition of posters at the Mercure Clermont-Ferrand Centre Jaude hotel.

 32 artists will be exhibiting alongside the illustrator honoured by this 47th edition of the Court, to whom an original risograph is dedicated. From 24th January to 23rd February.
- Anatomie du Labo exhibition, the lab remains a place for art and experimentation, for images and sound, and this exhibition adds a graphic dialogue between visual artists and the films selected. At Le Lieu-Dit from 31st January to 15th February.

RESIDENCIES

Sauve qui peut le court métrage's creative label offers writers-directors who have already had a work selected at the short film festival the chance to take part in short or feature-length screenwriting residencies. The programme of residencies and training courses is constantly evolving.

Writing short and feature-length screenplays

In 2025, **Héloïse Fressoz** will spend 6 weeks working on her feature film project *Les Avalanches* at the Villa Sabourin in Clermont-Ferrand.

The duo **Carine May** and **Hakim Zouhani** benefited from this residency in 2019 for a feature film project called **La Cour des miracles** screened at the Cannes Festival in 2022.

In 2018, another duo worked in residence at Villa Sabourin: Fanny Liatard and Jérémy Trouilh. They were writing the script for what was to become the film *Gagarine*, a feature-length version of the short film of the same name, which has been selected for over 30 festivals and was awarded the Cannes 2020 label.

It was **Giacomo Abbruzzese** who benefited from the very first feature film scriptwriting residency in 2016. He worked on his project **Disco Boy**, a feature film that won the Silver Bear in Berlin in 2023.

This residency takes place at the Cziffra auditorium at La Chaise Dieu for a week, and in 2025, director Vaiana Gauthier, composers Nina Garcia and Ying-Hshueh Chen will be on hand to record the music for the short fiction film Sentinelle.

Writing original music for short films

In 2023, director **Martin Gleiser** took part in this residency, accompanied by composer **Sylvain Livenais**, to write the music for his film **Bultex**. This film is being presented this year in the Close up programme under a new title: **Accalmie**.

The music for L'heure de l'Ours, winner of the César for Best Animated Short Film in 2021, was largely composed during the residency. In 2017, Agnès Patron and composer Pierre Oberkampf came to work at the Cziffra auditorium.

Scriptwriting and animated fictionshort films at Moulins

Noah Cohen and Joyce Kuoh Moukouri will be working at the Musée de l'Illustration Jeunesse in Moulins for 6 weeks in 2025. They will be working on their projects, *Les rois d'un monde* for Noah and *Perpétue* for Joyce.

During the last residency, in April 2024, it was the director **Bertille Zenobie**, originally from the region, who came to work on her project *Folie Douce*.

She had already presented her short film *Chienne* in international competition in 2021 and returns this year with a new short film in competition: *Jason and the Kingdoms*.
